













Knowing the language of a foreign country brings out the understanding between two groups of people with different languages and cultures.




Human events from the early developments of stone age man to the wars of the worlds around us, taught those that elected World History for a credit, their historic and ancestral heritage.

Compulsory for seniors, one semester of American Government, puts emphasis on current affairs, the political, social, and economic American Way of life.


Civics and World Geography gave students insight of all forms of government and the relation of man to an environment. Economics put stress on the satisfying of man's material needs.















Diversified Cooperative Training is a vocational program combining a half day working on a job. It is designed to give the students a background in skill occupation. Five major occupations are represented in this two-track program, which encompasses general areas as well as specific elements related to specific occupations. This year the seventeen students, instructed by Mr. Barber, have also done some projects, like collecting trading stamps and selling all-weather jackets.

The Business Office Education Program is developed for students who need depth training in the skills and related areas of office occupations. There is no work experience involved - all the training is done in school in a stimulated office situation to prepare the students for an office career. This two-year stenographic is designed for eleventh and twelfth grades, in which they learn typing, shorthand, business law and English, and office practices. This prepares students for entry-level clerical and stenographic positions.





Directly, the Superintendent serves in the areas of general administration and staff personnel, and sees that the regulations and rules of the Board of Education are carried out. Professional advisement of the Board, Administration Staff, and the Teaching Staff, also rank among his duties.

The Principals act as chief administrators of their buildings. Responsible for teachers, secretaries, custodians, and all other workers assigned to their buildings, they pursue their daily tasks. Most of an, the Principals supervise the entire education program within their buildings.






































































