





Being able to tackle the big "88" Homecoming game requires all the spirit that SHS students can provide.





"When the clock strikes 12" was the theme for the 1988 homecoming. The dance was held on October 15 at 8:00.



It happens every year, even to the best of students. It is unavoidable! For some it starts at the beginning of the school year, for others not until the last few months of SENIORITIS!




Kelleye Justice wishes she would have taken college bound classes instead of so many home economic classes. She also wishes she would not have missed so much school. Christine




friends that way.

sophisticated. She wears nice proper dresses or suits and touches it off with elegant jewelry. She knows how to dress for success, (2).
















Do you remember your first love?




That is what one may have heard during the "Senior auction" a fundraiser given by student council. The auction was held March 1, and it ws a great success and a lot of fun.





fall and winter seasons. Cheerleaders lift school spirit by planning pep rallies, decorating the school, and cheering at the games.



SHS "Hoosiers" bring home sectional title








The 1989 track season was an exciting season. Micki Kaczynski broke a school record, Gretchen Danner got all PCL, and everyone else tried their best at the events.

Junior Bill Lintz led the cross country team to a 4-4 sixth place finish in the league, while the golf team coached by Bill Buemi posted a 14-12 record.









Fischer and Dave Prince were also honored with All-League selections.


There are also clubs that do a lot of school service as well as community service. This year, for the first time Student Council worked with the


This year there were 25 new members 3 of which were seniors the rest were juniors. All NHS inductees must keep a grade point





All That Jazz

"This is my best year so far, it's a lot of fun even though there's a lot of work with prom," said junior class treasurer Kim Hydash.








The option of ordering a class ring is also available to sophomore students. Students can have any clubs,


sports, or activities they are involved in engraved into their ring along with their graduation year. Sophomores, after turning sixteen, can also take driver education classes before school each morning.

Patawaran 1989 Prom Queen. Afterwards the entire court danced to "Eternal Flame" by the Bangles.



"I was really glad it didn't rain. It was great for everyone to be together like that one last time before graduation," said Karyn Kravetz.










