Seniors cop top spirit week competitions





The annual contests between the four classes ended with the seniors winning both the hall decoration and the spirit link competitions.


















Cagers prove can play with best


Girl cagers take it to basket


The lady Rockets won against Mogadore by a margin of 50-45 and they beat Aurora by 20, of a score 57-37.







Chorus improves in size, quality







Our Bowl team Lows questions Loss for answers



Mr. Easter's science club explores unknown


Club offers science activities


Mr. long has worked at WKNT am/fm(now WNIR/WJMP) for eight years, WHLO for three years, and WAUP (now WZIP) for three years.




he flowers are ready; the tuxedo is rented; the dress is bought; and the juniors and seniors at SHS are set for a night of formal fun.


Not only were the students allowed to attend the formal dance, but they were also allowed to visit the penguin encounter and the aquarium at the park.
