Halloween. Halloween has become a tradition here, as dressing up at the high school is not an event at most schools. The students this year handled themselves well and set the pace for years to come.


The Halloween spirit was contagious this year, with a lot of people participating. Costumes ranged from Dolly Parton to a Christmas Tree.

"It was a lot of fun getting dressed up," stated junior Mellissa Flick (Christmas tree). "I am really looking forward to doing it again."




Classes compete once again during





Rockets win PCL for first time since 1984 with a 8-2 season tying school record




"The team worked hard," stated senior lineman John Dalton. "Regardless of what the score was the team never lost spirit, and that was a key goal that helped us win the league."







Inexperienced Harriers improve running times






Basketball team caps tough season







Boardwines cop titles, lead team to 4th in state




The Rockets ended their season with a loss to the Garfield G-men 59-64. The Rocket team had a 2-9 dual meet record ending eighth in the PCL.












Prom lives up to theme
