







failed emergency levy and the cutbacks and fees that followed. It was a
tough year to be an active student at
SHS. A \$15 activity/club fee and a
\$35 sports participation fee were
imposed, along with the controversal
\$10 parking fee.

Everyone prepared for the worst as the February emergency approached, but the money situation was not comfortable for students and staff even before February. The busing of high school students was eliminated to allow six bus drivers to be laid off. Supplies were low at SHS because the


money required to purchase paper, chalk and other necessities was not available.


The outlook for the next school year could be grim. More cut-backs could be on the way ranging from staff cuts, class cuts, activity/sports cuts and more material cuts. The lack of state funds and community support placed SHS students in an awkward position. Some students complained about the situation while others tried to fix it, but everyone was affected in some way by the losses.

A lot of community effort was used to promote the February levy from public rallies to phone surveys. Director of Curriculum, Mr. Bob Love, filled in the seat of Mr. Jack Carney after he retired in December. Mr. Love publicized the levy to students and community members by distributing leaflets and talking to them.

Everyone at SHS is adapting to a new way of life. With the lack of funds and the students' continued concern in getting the most they can out of Streetsboro High School, a battle for a proper education, although an important and necessary conflict, will always need to be fought. In the meantime, the students of SHS must make due with what they have and keep up the Rocket Spirit which holds the school together. In the meantime, the students of Streetsboro High School will be sweating it out.








artwheels, jello and eggs were just a few of the ingredients that made up Streetsboro High


was the theme at SHS when the Student Council hosted the annual Homecoming dance.








Dress-up days, victory highlight annual festivities







Gridders take second straight Crown

he 1992 Streetsboro Rocket football team finished the season once again as **PCL champions**. The Rockets amassed a record of 9-1 throughout their PCL schedule. This record broke an existing school record of 8-1-1 to become the best season in Streetsboro history.

In the division IV playoffs the Rockets lost a close game, 28-14, against the Manchester Panthers. The playoff game was the first of its kind in the history of Streetsboro football.

The incredible season landed the team a lot of press this season. Among the many honors, senior quarterback John Zelenak received the TV 23 Player of the Week award and best offensive back awards, senior co-captain and linebacker Tim Huffman received the Akron Beacon Journal Player of the Week and Player of the Year awards, and senior wide receiver **Bob Wirth** received the **East Central Ohio Player of the Week and best defensive** back awards.

Junior tackle Joe Harshbarger received the rookie of the year award, and junior defensive back Jamey Long received the most improved player crown. Senior linebacker Mike Giebel took away the Coaches Award this season. Senior co-captains, tackle Brian King and defensive tackle Jason Smith took home the best offensive and defensive lineman awards for the second consecutive year, and junior defensive back Dave Podwoski won the best defensive back award.

Head coach Dave Hostetler also received PCL and Akron Beacon Journal Portage County Coach of the Year honors for the season.



























Cagers plagued by injuries and inexperience










he 1992-93 Streetsboro basketball team had a troubling season this year, finishing a disappointing 6-13 on the season. The Rockets struggled due to injuries and a younger team than the rest of the league. The team did, however, show definite signs of improvement and finished the season strong. "With only two seniors, six juniors, and four sophomores it took a while to get experience," said head coach Terry Peterson. "The only way to get experience is to get some time on the court in a game situation."

The bright spot on the Rockets this season was without question the defense. As the offense struggled the defense shined. The Rockets were tough on the defensive side of the game and frustrated many of the


leagues top scorers. "Our defense was excellent this season," said assistant coach Tom Pollock. "Without good play from them we would not have been as close to every team as we were."


Rough season is putting it mildly when speaking of this year's girls' basketball team. A winless season is tough on any team, and the Rockets were no different.



Frustrating pretty much summed up the entire season.










Sweating out sixth place state finish







Frustrating season for Rockets








The reason for their low amount of wins could be blamed on lack of experience. Eleven out of the 17 girls were freshmen, there were four sophomores, and two seniors.




A sure sign that a sports program is turning around is when long time school records begin to fall. Even better when these records fall to underclassmen. That was pretty much the highlight of the boys' track season.

Also putting his name in the record books was sophomore **Mark McClendon**. His time of 52.0 got him close to a regional track berth in the 400 meters.





Members of the newspaper staff go through the same ordeal. Despite all the hassle of putting the paper together, the staff always manages to produce an award-winning paper!




Who! Came to Dinner
