so he and assistant coach Coni French took the girls to Columbus to watch the Lady Buckeyes against Michigan.








Baseball team struggles



The Rockets have also committed 78 errors this season in 19 games. "At this level we can not afford to make 4 errors a game and expect to win many games," Coach Terry Peterson said. The team has compiled a 6-13 record overall, a 2-5 North Division record and a 2-3 South Division record.



he Rocket softball team made up for a heart breaking 2-1 loss to the defending state champ Tallmadge Blue Devils by winning the first PCL title in school history.



"The real difference this year was that we finally came together as a team," Steffner said. "We have had the talent for the last couple of years, but it took until this year for everything to gel."


Bloomquist, Steffner and Dye were joined on the All PCL team by junior B.J. Alexander. Named as a utility player B.J. batted .365 including three triples.




Student Council
