





In 1821, Streetsboro was divided into 100 lots and sold. Before then it had belonged to the Hudson Township. It was not until 1826 that the first school was built. The school house was located in the northwest corner of the township, by then the population was only 1,108. In 1905, six school districts combined and formed one central school. The high school was not built until 1962, this forced high school students to attend their neighboring schools.

Streetsboro depended mainly on their dairying, but this would all change as an addition would soon be made. In 1955, the Ohio Turnpike was built, according to a local newspaper, it was this highway that triggered the city's phenomenal growth.



Everyday, Streetsboro transforms into a larger and larger community. 
Spirit Week Spirit from SHS and beyond!

The "Incredible Energy Egg" seemed to have worked for the Rockets because they walked away with an incredible hard fought win of 34-15 over the G-Men.














Wizard of Oz Homecoming 1996








National Honor Society






Group stresses service to others






Team wins firstTV title



Staff receives highest rating ever

The Orbiter staff has done it again. The fall issues received the Orbiter's 18th consecutive award from the American Scholastic Press Association of New York. The paper earned a first place with Special Merit in the division of senior high school with 500 or less enrolled students. The paper was scored on a point system with a total of 1000 points possible. This year's Orbiter received 990 points, outscoring the previous highest score by 30 points. "You have an excellent publication," said an ASPA judge.

Senior editor, Sara Mauer, was pleased with the results. "It was a relief to win and to know that the tradition of winning did not stop while I was senior editor," she said.

The Orbiter staff covered a variety of important school, state and nationally related topics. These included stories about Streetsboro's search for a new superintendent, the wrestling team's state title and America's problems with religion in school. "The staff was very competent, and it showed," said advisor Mr. Dave Hostetler.



Most cast members agree that hard work at practices paid off. "We all worked hard, and the play turned out great in the end," said cast member Jen Seiverth.












Science Club







Football Gridders capture Division title




playoffs," senior captain Brian Schassar said. At the state playoffs, the boys rebounded by beating Waterloo again, and moving into the second round for the first time in its short history.








Boys' Basketball Notch first winning season in 6 years




Girls' Basketball







Every single wrestler on the Streetsboro wrestling team can proudly say "we are the Division III State Wrestling Champs of Ohio."






The boys' varsity baseball season ended with a record of third place in the PCL and sixth place overall.






Softball Young team finds success

The Lady Rockets consisting of 16 players strived to reach the high expectations of last year's team. To do so they needed many things to happen. For example the underclasmen had to step up.





This year has been a learning experience for the team and will help them build the program for the future.


"We are going to go out with the young guys and work on technique and form to build improvement," Coach Hostetler said, "We'll just see where that takes us from there."
























Dowder Duff Football Lady senior gridders end with a tie

In November, a hijacked Ethiopian airliner crashes after running out of fuel. The crash occurs near a resort beach in the Comoros Islands in the Indian Ocean. At least 123 of the 175 people on board die, including the hijackers.

After 36 years, Central America's longest civil war ends when Indian rebels and military leftists sign a truce in Guatemala.

British Telecommunications agrees to purchase MCI Communications for up to \$21 billion in November. The deal is the biggest foreign purchase of a U.S. company ever concluded.

A U.N.-negotiated treaty banning chemical weapons worldwide is set to take effect in the spring. The treaty prohibits the development, production, stockpiling or use of chemical weapons, and calls for the destruction of existing supplies. The treaty is signed by 160 nations, including the U.S.



Bosnia's Muslim Party of Democratic Action, is elected chairman of the country's new three-person presidency in September. The election is held in accordance with provisions of the U.S.-brokered Dayton peace agreement.





The Miss World beauty pageant, held in Bangalore, India in November, raises a storm of protests, some violent, including one by a group threatening to stage a mass suicide during the pageant's telecast. A new Miss World is crowned without incident.



The U.S. Army issues strict new policies for drill instructors and female trainees, as hundreds of complaints of sexual harassment are revealed in November, Drill instructors are now required to leave their doors open if a female is inside, and women must travel in pairs.

After thousands of veterans complain of illnesses since the 1991 Persian Gulf War, the Pentagon warns they may have been exposed to chemical weapons. The Pentagon reveals that up to two tons of sarin nerve gas may have been released.

Six-year-old beauty pageant queen JonBenet Ramsey is found murdered in the basement of her parents' Colorado home the day after Christmas, Her death raises a nationwide awareness of controversial youth beauty pageants.

Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich (R-Georgia) is fined \$300,000 in a bi-partisan vote after the House Ethics Committee's year-long investigation into alleged financial improprieties.



Former U.N. ambassador Madeleine Albright is nominated for Secretary of State by President Clinton on December 5. Confirmed in office in January 1997, Albright is the first woman to head the State Department.



Seven-year-old pilot Jessica Dubroff is killed when her Cessna airplane crashes shortly after take-off in bad weather from the Cheyenne, Wyoming airport. Her flying instructor and her father, the plane's two passengers, are also killed in the April 1996 crash.




