

Senior Angela Wilson concentrates hard on her typing work. The final typing project requires extra proofreading to be sure that no mistakes are overlooked.









over the years."



## Yearbook Staff helping Rockets look back


The 1997-1998 yearbook staff created something most people will keep throughout their lives... a high school yearbook. A yearbook filled with memories, traditions and new ideas.


This yearbook contains photographs that will make students remember their high school the way it really was, and the way they would like to think it was.





In the end, fourteen people working together made this yearbook what it is, a "Golden Key" to unlock the memories of Streetsboro High School's 1998 school year.

























