
























WHAT?









uring the fall, the focus is only the marching band, with the remainder of the year focusing on concert band. Marching band begins in the summer, with 8:30 a.m. rehearsals and band camp, where the pre-game and first halftime show are learned. Also at this time, the "rookies" are taught how to march and play music at the same time. During a typical season, the Marching Rockets perform at 10 football games, three band shows, a marching band concert, and other performances at various locations in and around the community. This year, they performed at all the

football games, the Cuyahoga Falls Band Show and the Medina Band Show. Immediately after the conclusion of the football games, symphonic band begins. This group plays three concerts, participates in solo and ensemble contests, performs at commencement, and participates in the Memorial Day Parade. In December, the group featured arrangements of "Mars" and "Jupiter" from "The Planets," a challenging band standard called "Havendance," a "Fanfare for Christmas," and Mannheim Steamroller's rock version of "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen." In May, they lightened up and played familiar pieces like medleys from movies and new Broadway shows. Pep and jazz bands also perform during the year. Pep band plays upbeat pop music for a number of the home boys' and girls' basketball games. while jazz band performs styles like swing, funk, bossa nova and Latin; students are often featured soloists with improvised material.








In the past year, 88.9 WSTB has gone through multiple obstacles to keep itself afloat and uphold its reputation as one of the only high school student-run radio stations in the area. The purpose of WSTB is to serve the community with a genre of music many other stations do not play. Some students choose to be DJs

because they want to "bolster their journalistic experiences" and others say it allows them to be stronger public speakers. WSTB has an annual fund drive to raise money for the following year. Staff members pitch a tent at the Relay for Life, and also take a break in the summer to go on the Goodtime cruise. 

Financial issues made this a rough year for the choral music program. Due to the financial cuts --a result of three consecutive failed levies -- the treble ensemble was unable to travel to Cleveland to sing the national anthem at the Cleveland Cavaliers game.

"Singing for the Cavs last year was a honor and accomplishment," Spurlock said. Her group would not have had to audition again "due to their **superior rendition**" last year. Spurlock said the superintendent and school board refused to let the ensemble travel to "The Q," even after she devised several different scenarios to cover the cost. Despite such issues, Spurlock said all choirs worked hard this year.

The director is facing another challenge as the year comes to a close: preparing for the loss of 12 seniors in treble ensemble and 25 seniors total.

As juniors, students have the option to attend Maplewood Career Center in Ravenna with nine other school districts. Students can choose from 25 career and technical labs -- ranging from welding to culinary arts -- to work hands-on and get a head start on their future professions.

When school begins at 8:21 a.m., juniors attend three-hour labs while seniors are in 40-minute academic classes. The schedule switches in the afternoon: juniors are in academic classes while seniors are in labs.


