




















Although the students thought it would be too big to navigate, they quickly adjusted and learned the ins and outs of the new school.


All grades complained about the staff being more strict in the new building, especially about not letting food and drink (other than water) outside of









With returning students and newcomers, the 2017 staff, advised by Polly Dierkens, tackled the 144-page yearbook with ease. The theme "Here, There... Anywhere" reflected the unity and family-like essence the individuals inside Streetsboro High School shared, no matter what building they were residing in.

Eleven veteran staff members and nine rookies made up the team, allowing the establishment of different perspectives and new ideas to pour into the book. Two senior staff members, Madison Dabrowski and Racheal Pelter, attended the Buckeye State Yearbook Conference at Kenyon College for three days in July with Dierkens, and came up with the theme and cover ideas. The cover has a matte gray finish and "Anywhere" is a thermal design, which reveals a photo of the Rocket Marching Band when in contact with heat. The icon on the cover resembles a location dropper, furthering the notion of no matter where we end up or where we are located, the students and staff of SHS are united.

The 8.5x11 book of spirit and camaraderie was made with the Jostens' online "Yearbook Avenue" program. Primary headlines are 48 pt., left aligned, AYT David font. Secondary headlines are 32 pt., right aligned, AYT Arizona font. All photo captions are 9 pt., Chantilly (bold), with the first word of every caption in 10 pt., all caps, in colors corresponding with others on the page. Each photo credit is in 8 pt., Arizona font, and in the same color as the first word in the caption. "Cut out background" (COB) images are identified in 10 pt. David, with grades or titles and names on the first line, and photo credit on the second line in 8 pt. Arizona. Adobe Photoshop was used to create COBs, crop, adjust lighting and create color balance on several photos. Almost all photos were shot using the three Canon T3 Rebels in the classroom, or the cameras staffers owned or borrowed. Photos shot by individuals other than the staff were given credit through "photo courtesy of..." Venditti Studios took the sports team photos and Lifetouch took the students' portraits. Seniors were permitted to send in portraits from other photographers if they wished.

The starting price for the book was \$60 until September 30, then increased to \$65 until February 10, \$70 until March 24 and \$75 until May 19. The staff also held a Black Friday sale in November to sell inventory before moving to the new school. All books prior to this year's were priced at \$25 each for one week. The 2017 books will be distributed at the Back-to-School Ice Cream Social. Special thanks go out to Josten's field rep Alex Intihar and plant consultant Andrew Buhler for their patience, moral support and for making the production of the book possible.
