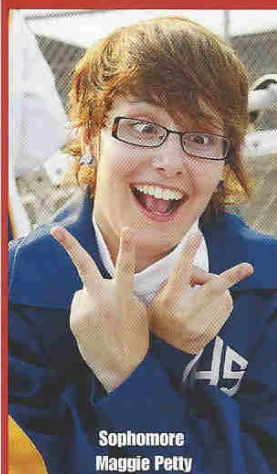

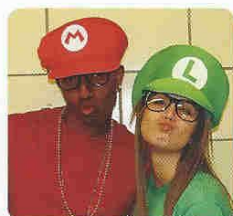

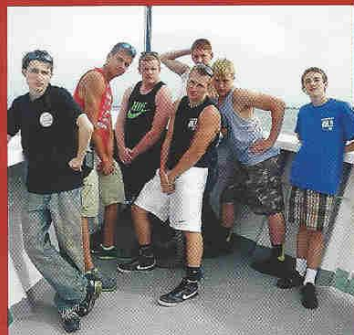


Summer lovin'

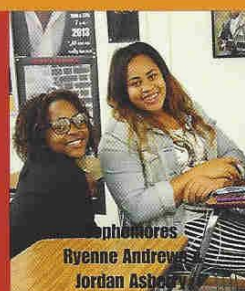

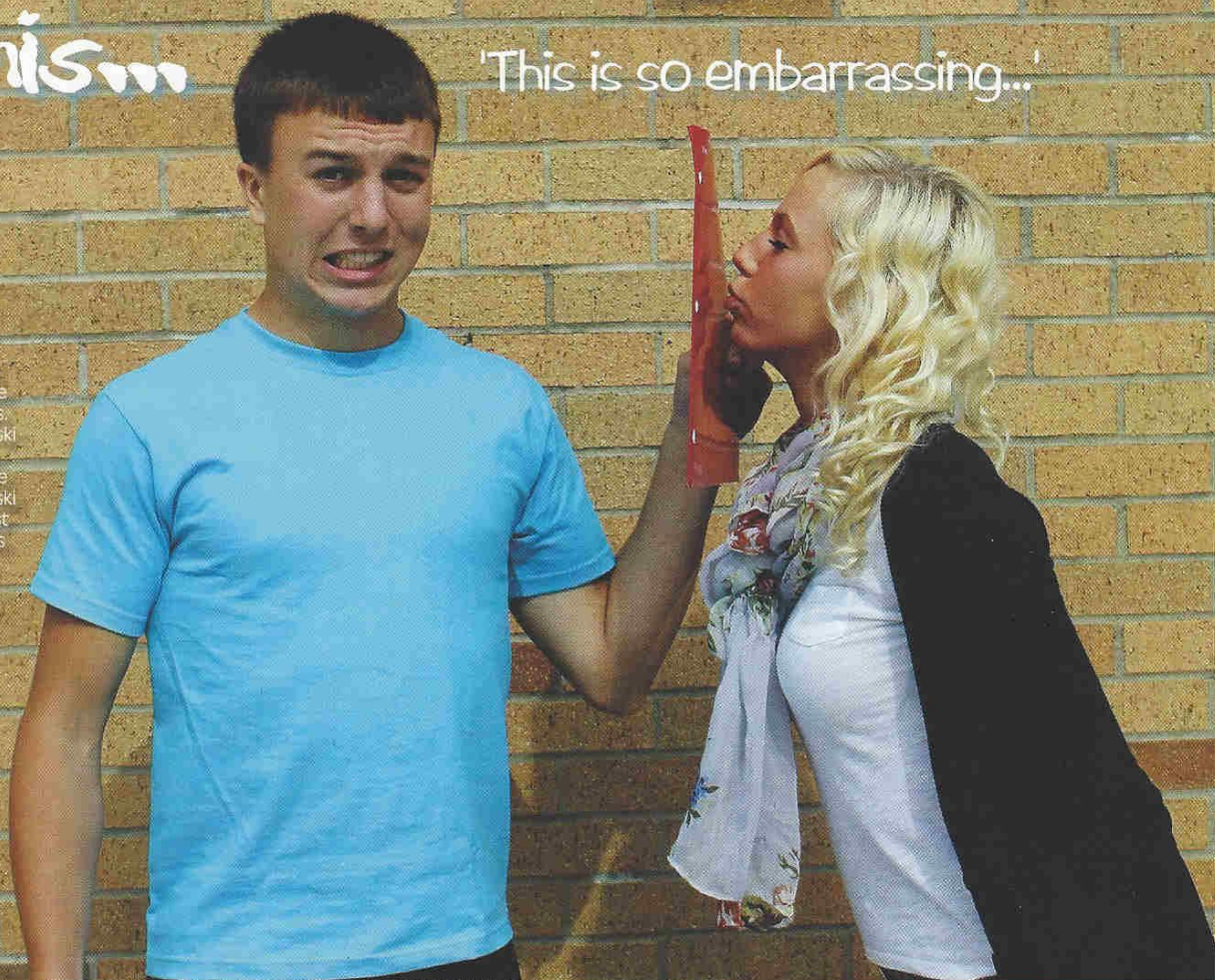

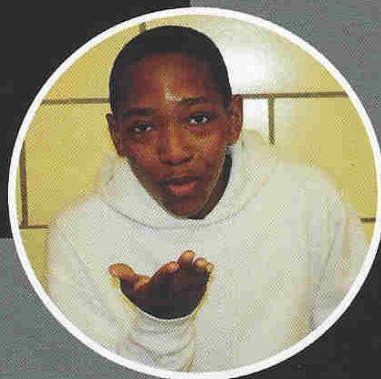
My first kiss went a little like this...

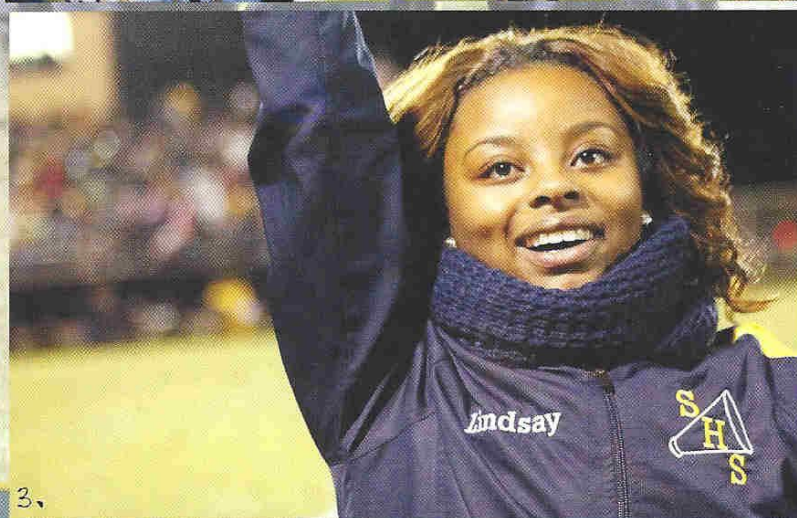

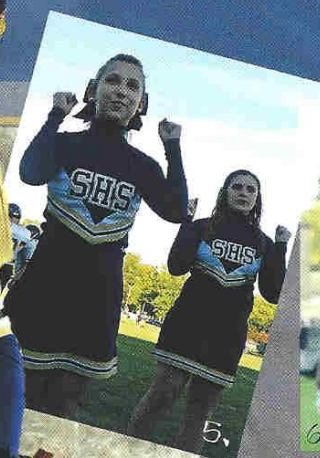

Marching Rockets branch out, travel and lose a leaf



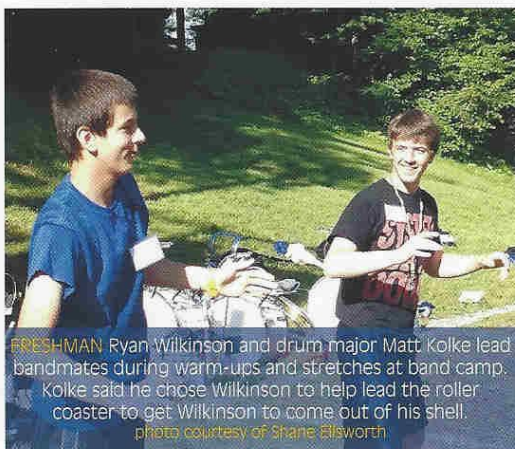

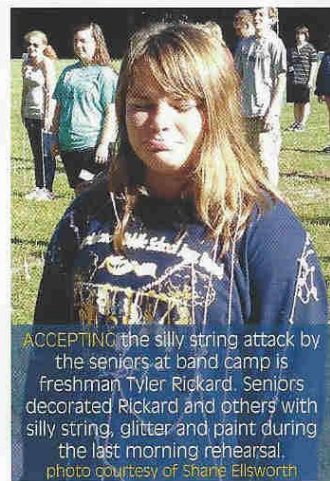

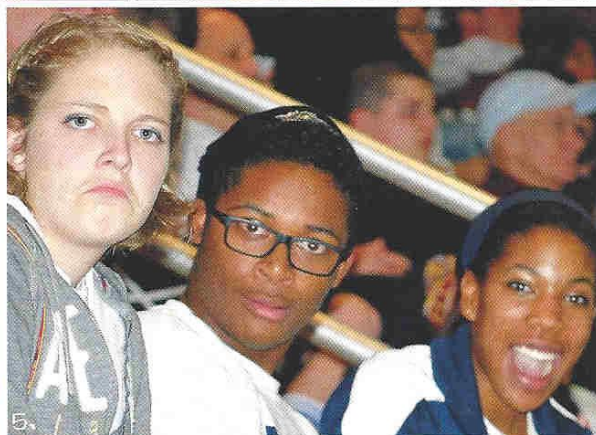
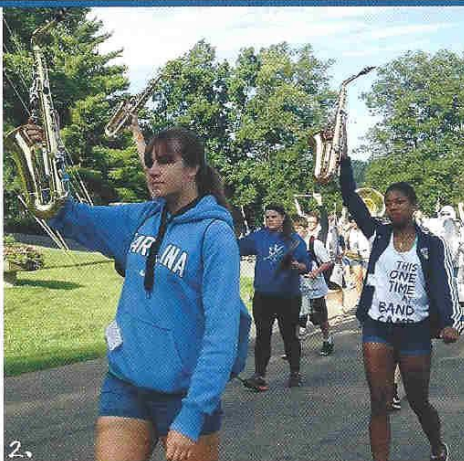

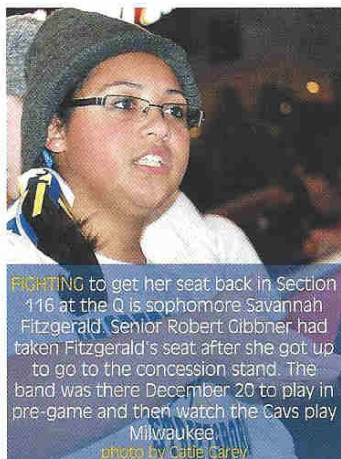

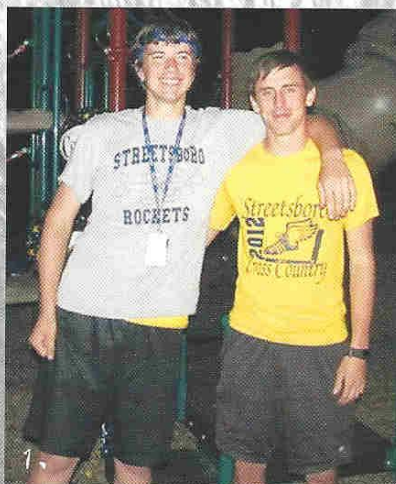

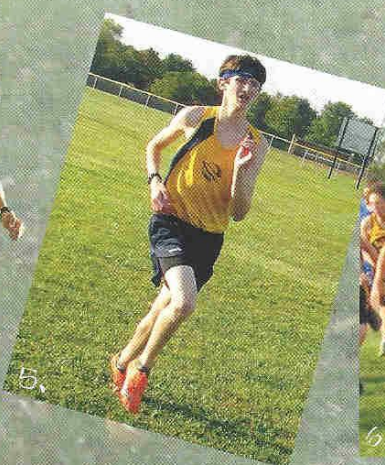

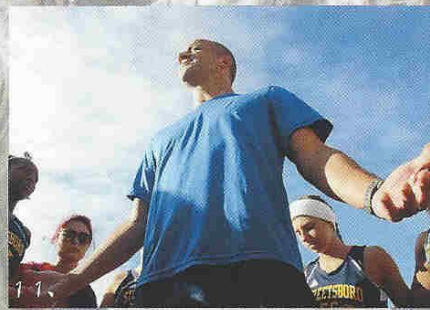

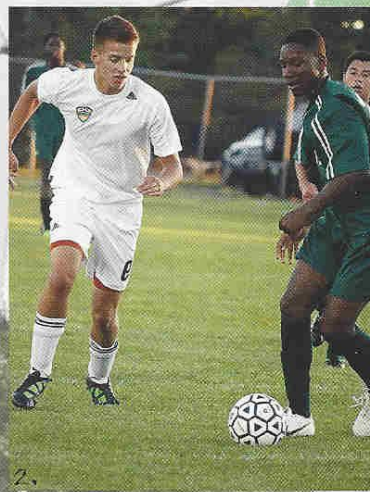

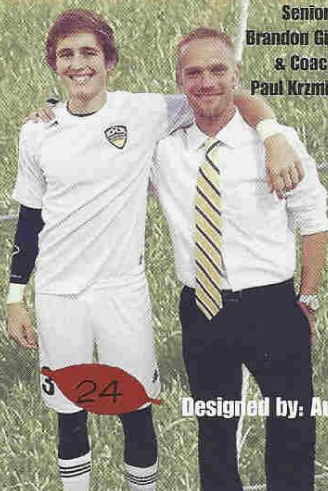
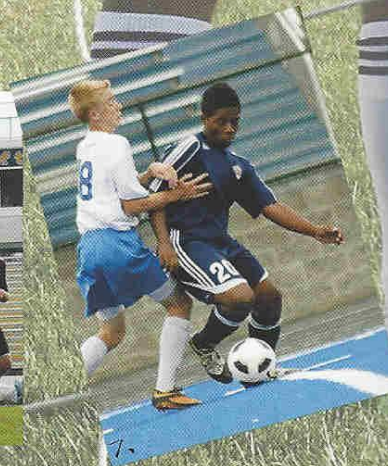
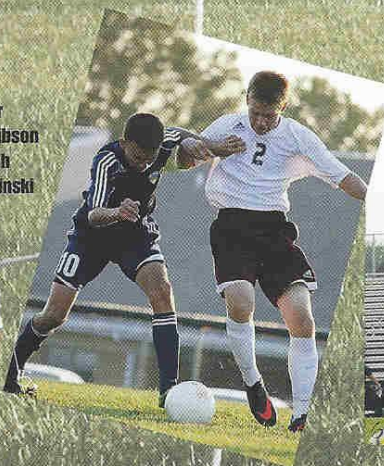

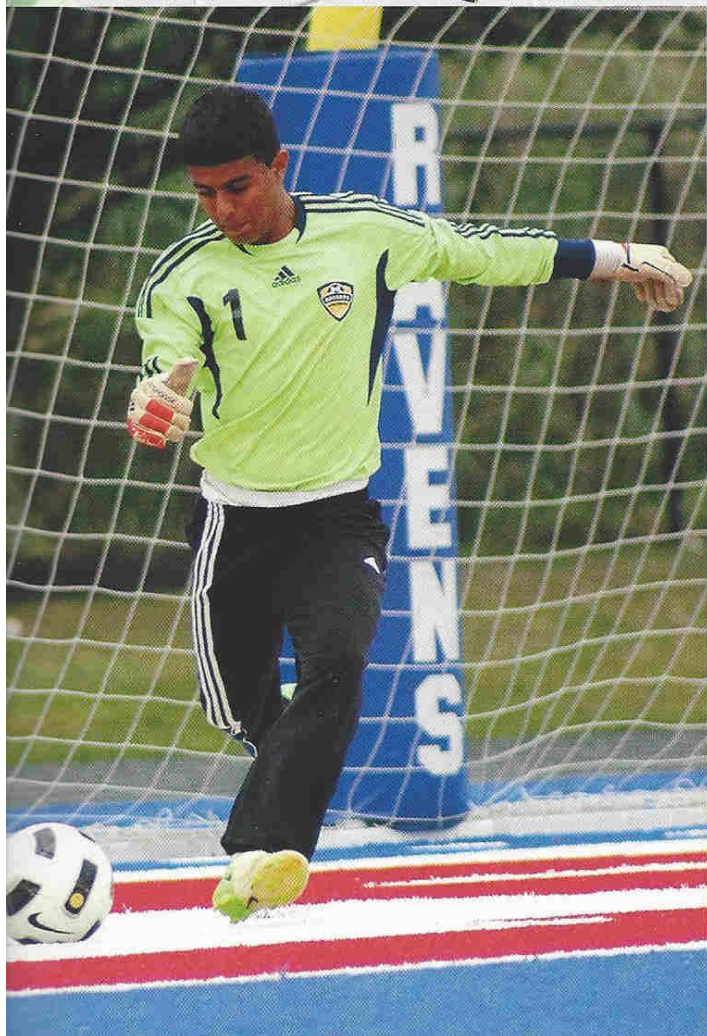

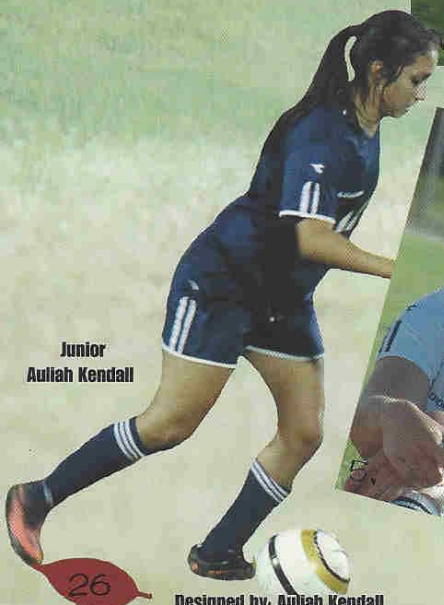

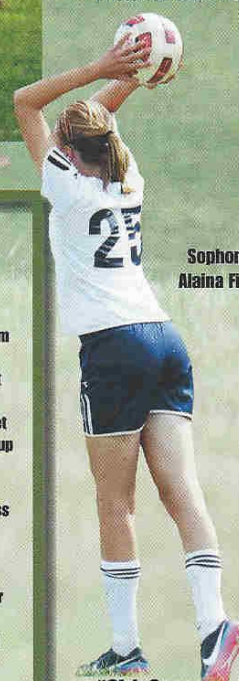

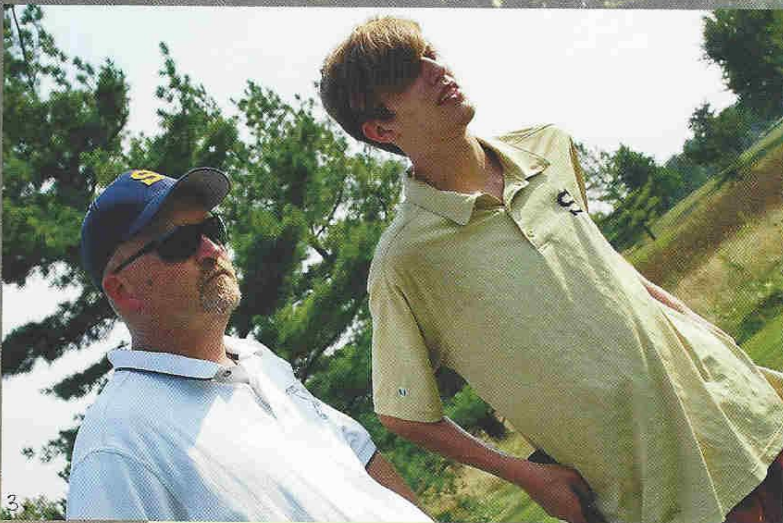

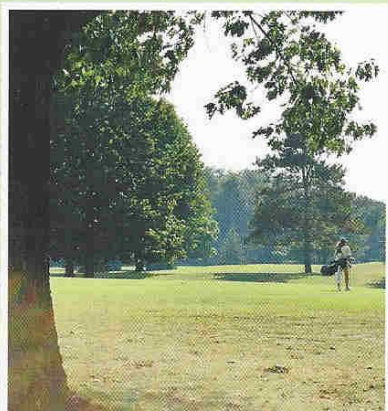

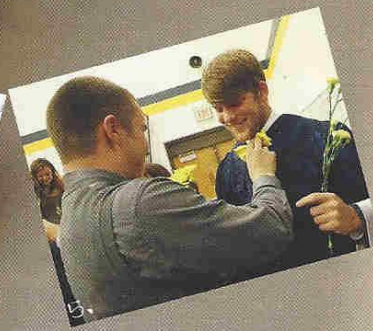

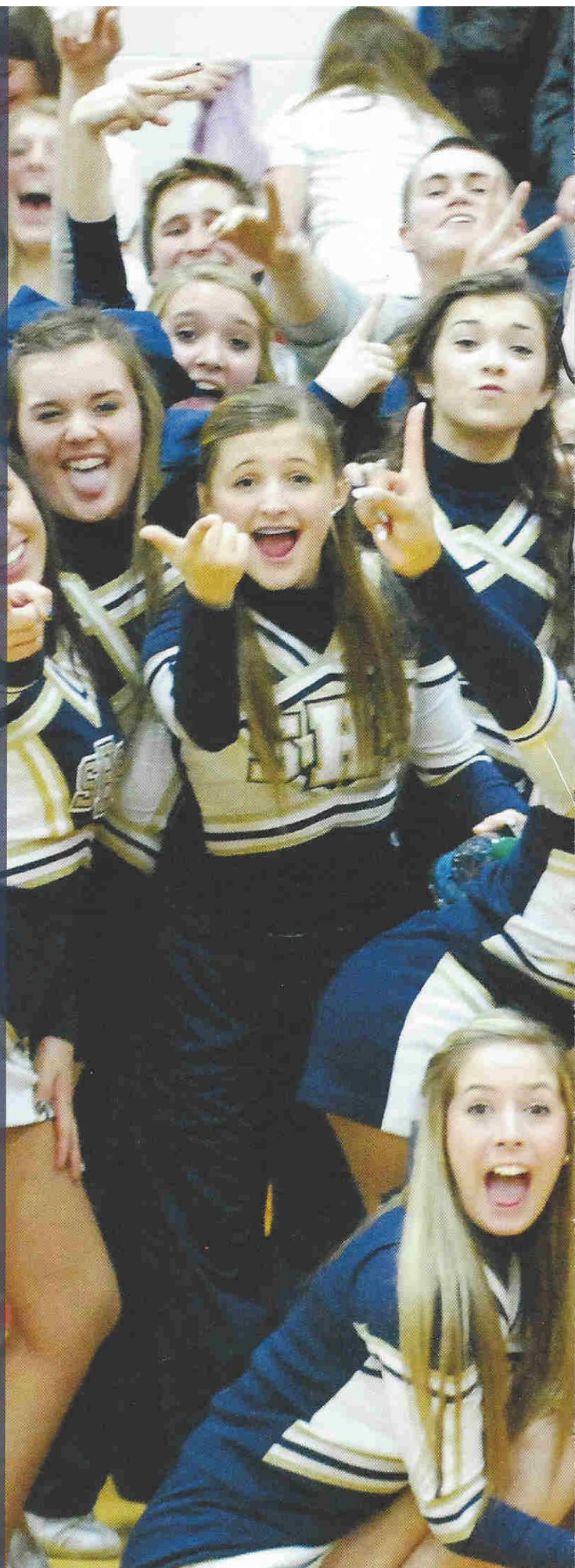
Winter

Despite the coldest, snowiest winter most had ever endured, the Rocket sports teams plow through their season. The girls basketball team breaks the school record for number of wins in a season with 15. Two players break individual records as well: Senior Marra Woods surpassed the single season rebound record with 254, and junior Alison Targosky beats the single season scoring record with 321 points. The boys basketball team is named PTC champs. Wrestlers overcome injuries while junior Tyler Rowland earns a spot as a state alternate. Weather keeps students and staff on their toes, when snowstorms brought foot after foot of snow and temperatures up to -40 degrees at times plagued the area. New legislation passes allowing four additional snow days and introduces the dreaded blizzard bags for students to make up work and days. The nine calamity days -- most of them due to temps -- leaves students and staff using up the three blizzard bags and all four extra days. Most of the winter schoolweeks are less than five days. One make up day is added to the end of the school year. Lack of school causes drama via twitter, with other schools and students feeling the pressure of being bombarded with work that now must be crammed into a 10-week period. As the season comes to an end in April, leaving nine snow days behind, the weather changes to reveal the first signs of a brief spring.

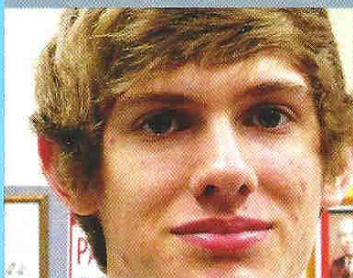
Students & staff bash blizzard bags

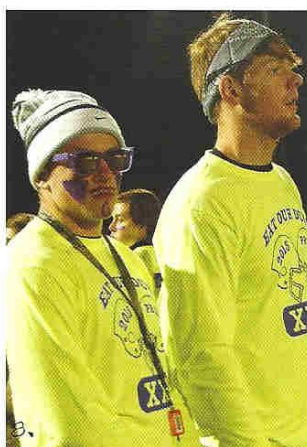

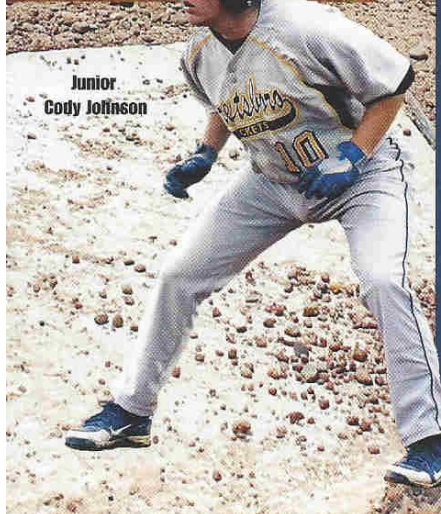
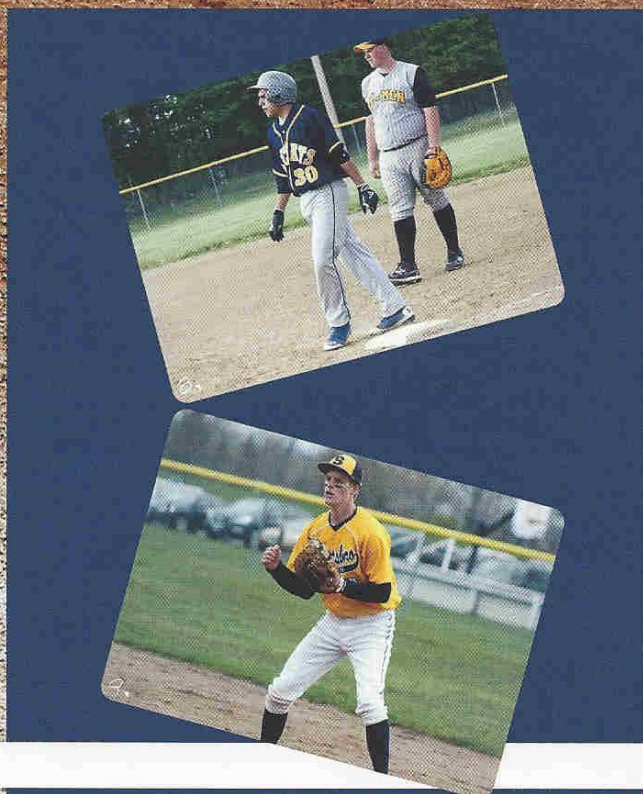


An odd superstition

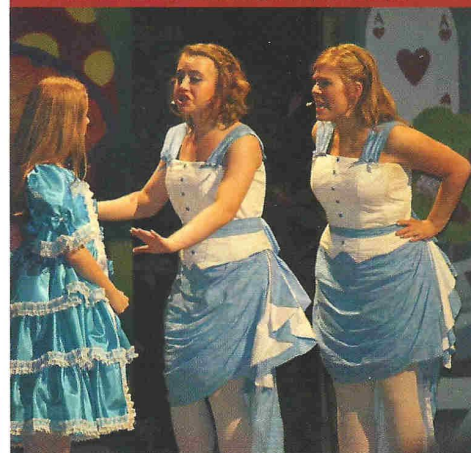

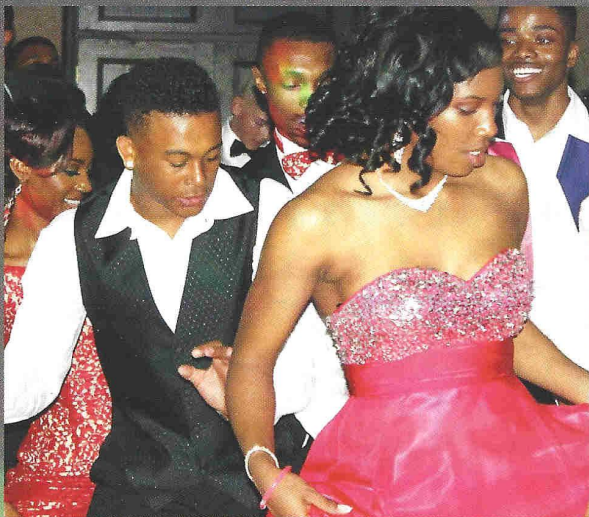

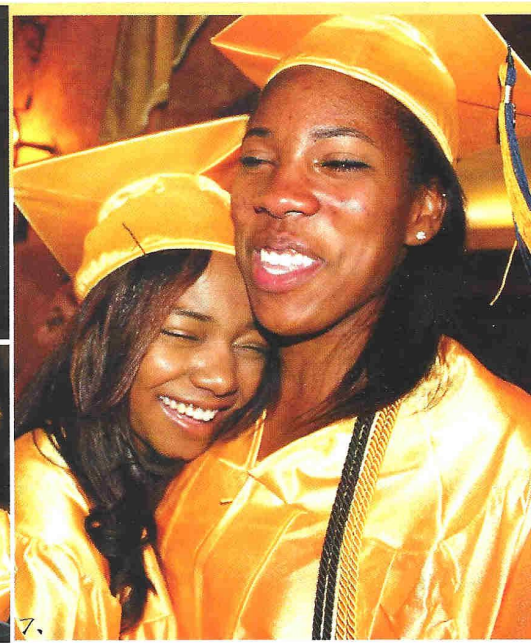

This 160-page book was a labor of love for the 13 students and several volunteer photographers who met sixth period -- and any other time that could be squeezed into their days -- in Room 302 with Adviser Polly Dierkens. Their original plan to release the book in May, to be followed by a summer insert featuring spring activities not included in the actual book, was thwarted by nine calamity days and numerous technical issues and outages. The early August release of this book was still a month earlier than usual. Branching out still happened on the production end, as the staff opted for a new cover design featuring a trendy, tactile element, instead of the laser-cut design used the two previous years.

Design-wise, several new features are included, such as the "First Kiss" and "Pet" pages. Other new design elements include subject references via the twitter-inspired hashtags on the bottom of all right pages. Photo credits now clarify the staffer responsible at the end of most captions. ("Courtesy of..." means the photos were taken by someone other than a student staffer.) Captions are longer and more detailed than they have been in the past. The goal is to provide readers with more story-telling and memory joggers in short form, instead of big blocks of copy no one wants to read!

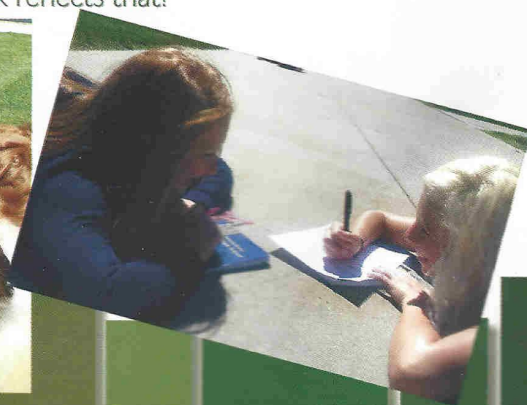
Each captions begins with an all-cap word in a color coordinating with other page elements, in hopes of adding contrast and making the text more easy to read. Other new features this year are extended coverage of the staff, and a more inclusive index, where readers will now see subjects/activities as well as staff included, along with the students.

The theme is carried out in leaf "folios" on the bottom of all pages, and the color changes each seasons. References to the theme can be found in the headlines (the font of which senior staffers chose because they thought the letters resembled branches) and alternative copy, too. Also repeating as part of the theme/concept are the colored boxes like those on this page. The color scheme here, on Pg. 1, and several other pages, is "earthy," to coincide with the theme.

Primary headlines are 40 pt. Earthquake, centered. Secondary heads are Clarence, 24 pt., centered. Captions are written in Antique Olive Light, 7 pt., and photo credits are 6 pt. Genuine is the font used for alternative copy, as well as the names/grades placed alongside COBs. These COBs were created using either yearbookavenue's "Effects" or in Adobe Photoshop. Photoshop was also used to crop and edit the lighting on many of the photos. Photos were shot using the two classroom Canon T3 Rebels, as well as various other cameras staffers owned or borrowed. The book was created using Jostens' online "yearbook avenue" program. Though the yearbook classroom is a computer lab, students and their adviser could often be found working on the book on their laptops, at home and in various local coffee shops.

The basic book was on sale for \$60 until Halloween, increased to \$70 until May, and then went up to \$80.

Though smaller and more socially diverse than previous yearbook staffs, this group worked together via full-class page critiques, a fall yearbook conference and in various late-night sessions, not to mention via texts and calls and messages during the school year and into late June, around the final deadline. Whether it was telling Hannah Roble to quit yelling, laughing at crazy Maddie Rogowski's remarks, telling only boy Tyler Garman to plug his ears during "girl talk" or inside jokes like the "Mean Girl's" reference said almost daily, "She doesn't even go here,," yearbook '13-14 was lively, productive and fun! Here's hoping the book reflects that!
